Aid is; money, resources, knowledge, support, goods and services given to those in need.

Some of the things given as aid include:

- money


- shelter

Type of Aid	Definition	Example
Emergency/short- term aid	Aid given to a location which has suffered from a serious event such as an earthquake.	Food, water and tents are urgently being sent to Syria to help people.
Developmental/long- term aid	Aid that provides support over many years which help to make changes that are <u>sustainable</u> .	'Water Aid' helps provide safe drinking water in Indian schools and provides hygiene lessons to students.
Public charity	Aid funded by people who voluntarily give money.	Donating money to OXFAM.
Tied aid	Aid that comes with conditions or as part of a deal between countries.	In 1991 the UK helped Malaysia build a dam on the condition that they increased trade with the UK.
Bi-lateral aid	Aid given from one country (or organisation) to another country.	Britain give money and send experts to Turkey to help build a dam.
Multi-lateral aid	Aid from international organisations which receive money from several countries or organisations.	United Nations or the World Bank.

Donors - Those that give aid to other countries. This could be in many forms. Often in the 'rich' north.

Advantages and disadvantages of aid:

Advantages:

- Emergency aid can save lives
- Aid can create jobs
- Projects such as water-aid can provide clean water and sanitation, and therefore improve health.
- Aid can rebuild homes after disaster.

Disadvantages:

- Aid can cause dependency for LIDCs on donors.
- Sometimes aid is not a gift, but a loan.
- Projects don't always benefit everyone.

How can aid be delivered?

Top down aid - These are usually large scale, expensive projects that are often planned and operated by a country's government.

Bottom up aid - These are usually small-scale projects run in conjunction with local people in the hope that it will directly benefit them.

The Xeset River Dams – Laos



Damns were installed in the river to provide electricity and economic development. Aid came from many countries and is a top down strategy. Local people benefited from the electricity, but many homes were flooded.

Playpumps - South Africa.

The merry-go-round is played on by the children but also pumps water out of the ground and stores it. This aid is a bottom up strategy as the local people learn how to maintain and look after the pumps. Unfortunately, it was

very expensive.



What are charities and why are they controversial?

Syrian refugee crisis

A refugee is a person who has been forced to leave their country to escape war, persecution, or natural disaster.

Syria is a country on the Mediterranean Sea, bordered by Turkey to the north, Lebanon to the west and Jordan to the south. They have been suffering from war since 2011, and there has been a huge increase in displaced refugees in this time.

How can aid help them?

Short-term/emergency aid – provide shelter, food, water and vaccinations when they arrive in the UK

Long-term/developmental aid – rebuilding projects in Syria, including schools and hospitals, and management of farms for economic development.
