What the curriculum is designed to do

In KS4 Drama we continue to develop the creativity of students by introducing them to more extreme and thoughtprovoking themes and stimuli. We explore a variety of theatre practitioners through a robust and practical set of workshop style lessons. We Practically explore our set text, Blood Brothers, as well as looking at written exam techniques. With extensive theatre evaluations we want our students to become more aware of theatre and its surroundings. Knowledge and understand of how Drama is formed is essential and is a huge make-up of the KS4 curriculum intent. Students are committed to applying skills that they have explored in KS3 with the view of creating personal artistic intentions. Creativity, collaboration, and confidence are all vital when it comes to KS4 Drama and students will develop and explore these in a more abstract way.

How we deliver the curriculum

The KS4 Drama curriculum is delivered through a blend of theory and practical lessons to provide students with the knowledge required for the course. We create and develop ideas for meaning as well as applying these skills to realise artistic intentions. Students analyse and evaluate their own work as well as demonstrating their own understanding. Students will study three components:

Component 1: Understanding Drama-Written exam on set text and live theatre evaluation.

Component 2: Devising Drama-Creating their own work from a stimulus

Component 3: Texts in practice-Performing a script

How we assess students

When embarking on their KS4 journey, students are assessed in a variety of ways including coursework, written exam and devised practical performance.
